

2018 Shoreview Citizen of the Year: Charlie Oltman

Charlie Oltman was honored by Mayor Sandy Martin and the Shoreview City Council with the 2018 Shoreview Citizen of the Year Award at the volunteer appreciation dinner on November 15.

A Shoreview resident for over 30 years, Charlie is a long-serving community volunteer. When he was just 12 years old Charlie dedicated his time to park trail maintenance, making sure everyone could access parks and trails, and earning a Boy Scout "Citizen in the Community" merit badge in the process. His passion for volunteering only grew from there. "Charlie is always willing to help, participate, and support efforts that make our community a better place for everyone. His concern for 'the other' seems to be a central and guiding principle for how he lives his life. He is simply a good person and model citizen that can/should serve as an example for us all," writes Charlie's pastor, Renee Patterson of Shepherd of the Hills Lutheran Church.

In Shoreview, Charlie first served as the President of the Turtle Lake Oaks Homeowner's Association. It was there that he helped build a strong neighborhood community and began his years of service to Shoreview.

extracurricular activities. Charlie has volunteered with more
than 10 community organizations over the years.



During the volunteer dinner, Charlie noted that one of the reasons he volunteers is to appreciate the little things in life. One of Charlie's favorite volunteer memories is from being a coach for his daughter's soccer team. Several years after coaching, a young woman approached him at Target to thank him for being her coach. He didn't realize it at the time, but his dedication had a lasting impact on the players that they carried with them into adulthood.

During her presentation Mayor Martin said, "Charlie has been a long-time booster of this community, from civic involvement and community service to neighborhood activism and professional generosity. He truly is a citizen volunteer." Charlie encourages everyone in our community to get involved, even for a one-time event.




One of the City's primary goals in putting together its budget and tax levy is to maintain the current services and programs that make Shoreview one of the premier communities to live in the Twin Cities. Shoreview prepares and adopts a biennial budget during odd- numbered years, and considers potential budget amendments for the second year of the biennial process.

The 2019 budget is the second year of the City's biennial budget. At the December 17, 2018 meeting, the City Council adopted the 2019 budget and tax levy that supports the City's general fund operations, capital replacement funds and debt obligations.

The City's 2019 budget of approximately \$30.4 million represents a 6% increase in spending across all City operational funds. This budget is supported by a tax levy of \$12,157,180 which is a 4.5% increase above the 2018 levy.

The tax levy primarily supports programs and services in the City's General Fund, as well as Capital Replacement Funds and debt service payments. The portion of the levy supporting City services accounts for roughly a 2.5% increase in the tax levy. The remaining 2.0% increase in the levy is the result of debt, capital replacement funds, capital improvement funds and the Economic Development Authority. The increase in the General Fund is due primarily to the increase in police and fire contract costs and personal services.

Offered in partnership with RamseyRecycles, the organic starter kit is the perfect way to try out kitchen composting. All food waste can be composted, plus many other items that normally can't be recycled, including greasy pizza boxes, tissues and paper towels, and egg cartons. Stop by Monday-Friday between 8 am - 4:30 pm to pick up your free kit.

Organics are accepted at all Ramsey County Yard Waste sites, including Arden Hills (3530 Hudson Ave.) and White Bear Township (5900 Sherwood Road). Organics recycling at the Como Park (1149 Beulah Lane) is open year-round, 24/7.



Shoreview Receives High Marks Again in Community Survey



Shoreview residents ranked the overall quality of life in the city highly again this year, according to Peter Leatherman of the Morris-Leatherman Company (MLC). The 2018 Community Survey showed that 97% of residents rated the quality of life in Shoreview as either excellent or good. Sixty percent rated the quality of life as excellent, which places Shoreview among the top two cities in the metro area that MLC has surveyed. Shoreview's quality of life ratings have been consistently very high, ranking as one of the highest quality-of-life cities in the metropolitan area since MLC began surveying Shoreview residents in the late 1980s.

Ninety-three percent of residents surveyed think Shoreview is headed in the right direction. According to Mr. Leatherman, only three other cities have a rating over 90% in this question. Further, 91% of residents surveyed either strongly approve or somewhat approved of the job the city council is doing. Finally, 76% of residents feel empowered and believe they can impact how things are run in the city, a result 16% higher than the average result in the Twin Cities.

Mayor Sandy Martin commented, "We are very pleased that residents continue to recognize and appreciate the exceptional quality of life we are fortunate to have in Shoreview and that they believe the city is headed in the right direction."

City services and recreation amenities also scored highly on the survey with some of the highest results in the metro.

- Police & fire protection services: 97% rated excellent or good.
- Other services (including drainage and flood control, park and trail maintenance): 90% rated excellent or good.
- Property taxes: 82% rated services they receive based on proposed taxes as excellent or good value.
- Trails: 43% of respondents use trails on a weekly basis and another 26% use them on a monthly basis, making them the most used recreation amenity.
- **Community center:** 98% rate their experience as excellent or good; 59% have someone in their household who is a member; 55% have used the community center in the past year.

The survey, which consists of phone interviews of 400 randomly selected Shoreview residents, provides results that are accurate to plus/minus 5 percent. The results of the entire community survey are posted on the city's website, along with a link to the video of Mr. Leatherman's presentation of the results to the council.



Survey Snapshot

- 98% feel accepted and welcomed in Shoreview
- 97% rated their quality of life as excellent or good
- 94% rated the sense of community as very or somewhat strong
- 93% think Shoreview is headed the right direction
- 91% approve of city council

The Community Center expansion project is now complete! The project included two distinct expansion areas including a major addition to the Tropics Indoor Water Park, Bamboo Bay, and a two-story expansion next to the gymnasium.

Several of the new features were highlighted in the November/ December 2018 ShoreViews and opened earlier including the expanded Tropical Adventure Indoor Playground, new fitness studios and activity rooms, and updated fitness center.

Bamboo Bay, the 7,000 square-foot addition to Tropics Indoor Water Park, opened on December 15 during a grand opening ceremony with Mayor Martin and the Shoreview City Council. This new area features a shallow splash pool with zero-depth entry, a large play structure with a number of slides, sprays, and large buckets that will provide hours of fun! Two cabanas are now available to rent for parties in this area.

Improving Water Quality & Conserving Water at Home

February 20

Paul Gardner, Shoreview Resident, Master Water Steward, and Water Conservation Advisor How rainfall interacts on our personal property makes an impact on water quality in nearby lakes, rivers, and streams. The Freshwater Society's Master Water Steward Program trains residents on how to make their property mimic the natural environment for better water quality. Paul Gardner will share how his home became an "experiment station." See what it takes to infiltrate rain back into the ground, reuse rainwater, and reduce the risk of having water in your basement! Paul will also share affordable tips to reduce indoor and outdoor water use.

Should We Care About Carp in the Owasso Chain of Lakes?

March 20

Bill Bartodziej, Natural Resources Specialist, Ramsey Washington Metro Watershed District Over the past ten years, metro-area lake and watershed managers have come to better understand the impacts of invasive common carp on aquatic systems. As a result, more advanced techniques to control this aggressive fish species are in use. Excess carp in lakes, especially shallow lakes, can have profound negative impacts on water quality and ecology. Bill Bartodziej will discuss the risks carp pose to our lake systems and recent advances in carp management. An update on carp management in the Owasso Chain, including population assessment, netting and barriers to prevent carp migration will also be included.

All presentations are held in the City Council Chambers at 7 pm and last approximately 45 minutes with additional time for questions.

City efforts support the value of housing in Shoreview

Survey results from the recent community survey found that residents take great pride in our community, due in part to our strong neighborhoods and strong sense of community. As our homes begin to age, investment and reinvestment is needed to maintain high quality neighborhoods. The Shoreview Economic Development Authority understands these needs and is working to encourage new housing choices, more reasonably priced housing options, and policies to help homeowners update their homes.

New housing

Shoreview has approved nearly 1,000 new apartment units since 2016, the first built in the city since the early 1970s. City staff worked with developers to create units in two developments that are affordable to those making 80% of the area median income and below. For a family of four, that's an income of \$71,900 or less. Smaller, single-family home developments were also approved.

Housing reinvestment

Reinvestment support is vital to ensure long-term quality, value and availability of a variety of housing options for current and future residents. A newly expanded home loan program offers support through a down-payment assistance loan, home improvement loans, a combination down-payment/home improvement loan and finally, a special home improvement loan for homeowners in mobile home communities. These loans encourage the purchase and/ or upgrade of Shoreview's more affordably-priced older homes.

These city-sponsored loan programs are administered through the non-profit agency, NeighborWorks Home Partners. NeighborWorks can assist residents with general home improvement projects, including guidance on the scope of a home improvement project, selecting the right contractor for the job, or reviewing project estimates. Other agencies including Ramsey County and the Neighborhood Energy Connection also administer loan programs accessible to Shoreview residents.

Residents can bring small household appliances, clothing, electronics, mobile devices and more to receive free guided assistance from volunteers with repair skills to disassemble, troubleshoot and fix items. Fix-lt Clinics build community connections and reduce the number of repairable objects that are thrown in the trash.

Bring your broken household goods and clothing in need of repair. Please also bring any tools and supplies you think might help with the job. Events are first come, first served. Shoreview residents can recycle clothing, textiles, shoes, and home goods right at their curb, no matter the condition! Just put unwanted goods into a Simple Recycling bag (available at City Hall or at **SimpleRecycling.com**) and place them at the curb BESIDE your recycling cart on your scheduled recycling day. All materials collected will be recycled. Simple Recycling is not a charity organization, so please continue to donate items in good condition to your regular donation service.

Saving energy and money this winter with a few easy tips.

No-cost tips to help save energy this winter

Turn the heat down. Turning the temperature down on your furnace just a few degrees can save big in the long run. Set it even lower when you're away from home or overnight helps too. If you have a programmable or smart thermostat, set it to a low heat setting while you're away at work, running errands or out of town.

Set your water heater to 120°. You'll still have water hot enough for home use but with far less energy use.

Let the sun in. Bright sunshine can help conserve heat energy. Just make sure to close curtains at night, up to 15% of your home's heat can be lost through uncovered windows.

Wash on cold.

Washing clothes in cold water will save you \$30-\$40 a year, and it's better for your clothes.

Close the fireplace damper.

Traditional fireplaces pull heated air out of the house and up the chimney. When not in use, make sure the damper is closed.

Lock windows. It tightens the seal to stop heat leaks.

Skip the dry cycle. Your dishwasher uses about half of its energy each cycle on the drying.

Move your sofa. Exterior walls tend to be drafty. Place your furniture near warmer, interior walls.

Eliminate wasted energy. Turn lights, fans and electronics off when you're leaving a room. Extra refrigerators or freezers can contribute to a high energy bill, if you don't really need them, unplug them.

Use a power strip. Most electronics still use energy when they're switched

"off". Consider plugging your TV/ DVD/Stereo into a power strip with an on/off switch.

Low-flow is the way to go. A low-flow shower head and faucet aerators can save water and energy, reducing the amount of hot water used for showers and dish-washing.

Get smart. Wifi-connected outlets, lamps, switches and electronics can be controlled from a smart phone, no

matter where you are, so you never have to waste energy from leaving the lights on. Smart thermostats can save hundreds of dollars a year.



Shoreview is home to many parks, lakes and open spaces – and the deer, fox, geese, ducks and turkeys that make their homes in our natural spaces. It can be tempting to feed the wildlife in parks and in our own back yards, but feeding wildlife can have a number of side effects including damage to property, collisions with vehicles, and negative health impacts for the animals.

- Human food isn't nutritious for wild animals and can cause serious problems.
- Wildlife dependent on human food gather in large numbers, which can spread disease in the animals.
- Feeding wildlife can cause them to lose their natural fear of people and some animals may become aggressive towards people, especially during breeding season.
- Increased damage to trees, plants, gardens and even homes and cars is common when large numbers of wildlife are present in residential areas.
- Increased exposure to residential pets exposes both pets and wildlife to injury or disease.

In order to keep people and animals safe, feeding wildlife is not permitted in Shoreview. Bird feeders should be placed high enough to prevent other animals from reaching the feed. Enjoy the wildlife at AHATS Wildlife Viewing Area in Arden Hills or at any of the parks and open spaces throughout Shoreview.

Shoreview's Sister City Celebrates 1250th Anniversary

2018 marks a big anniversary for the community of Einhausen, Germany, Shoreview's Sister City. Einhausen was first mentioned in historical records in the year 768 AD, or 1,250 years ago. (In German it's called a Jubiläum.) Einhausen is a proud little community of about 6,000 residents, in the German State of Hessen. It sits along the Wechnitz River at the foot of the Bergstrasse Mountains.

In August 2018, a delegation of 24 people from Shoreview and other parts of the US traveled to Einhausen to participate in the celebration. The group included former members of the 298th US Army Band who were in Germany on a reunion tour. While in Einhausen, delegation members stayed in homes of local residents – a great cultural exchange experience!

The anniversary has been celebrated by various activities throughout the year, including fireworks, parades, band concerts, outdoor light show, and a rubber duck race on the Wechnitz River with over 500 ducks!

Between Two Worlds: Identity and Acculturation


Thursday, January 10, 6:30 pm Shoreview Library
