City Partners with WaterSmart

Software helps residents learn about household water use



The City of Shoreview's Water Utility Service has recently made a sizable upgrade to help residents learn more about their water use habits and how they can save money on their water bill.

The City is partnering with WaterSmart Software to offer residents a modern digital portal where they can access detailed information about household water use. The portal can be accessed by mobile device or web browser at www.watersmart.shoreviewmn.gov.



All single-family residential homes now have access to a personal online water utility account that is updated monthly and customized by your home's features. Each account will have personalized recommendations for water conservation measures and cost-savings estimates for those actions.

To register for this free service, simply enter your billing account number and email address. You can then access all of your utility data as soon as it becomes available each month, see how your water use compares to similar sized homes in your neighborhood, and get access to customized recommendations on how you can save water and money.

Top 10 Election and Voting Questions Answered

1. When is the General Election?

The General Election is on Tuesday, November 8, 2016.

2. What time do polls open on Election Day?

Polls are open from 7 A.M. – 8 P.M. on election day.

3. How can I find where I vote?

Several of our polling places have recently changed. You can find a link to Ramsey County's Precinct finder and a map online at: <http://shoreviewmn.gov/government/voting-and-elections/find-your-precinct>

4. Can I absentee vote, and when?

Voters no longer need to state a reason for voting prior to Election Day. You can vote either in person or through the mail.

You can vote by absentee ballot beginning 46 days preceding an election. Absentee ballots will be available September 23 for the General Election. Apply and vote at Shoreview City Hall during normal office hours, Monday through Friday from 8 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., or from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M. on Saturday, November 5, or until 5 P.M. on Monday, November 7, 2016.

5. How do I absentee vote?

To begin the process, request an absentee ballot online at www.mnvotes.org.

Absentee voters may vote in person or complete the entire process by mail. If you are not a registered voter, a voter registration card will be included with your ballot and must be returned with the ballot. Absentee ballots can be completed in person or mailed to: Ramsey County Elections, P.O. Box 64098, St. Paul, MN 55164.

6. How do I vote if I or a spouse are in the military or overseas?

Military and overseas voters can use a special process to get and return their ballot. Check Ramsey County Elections website (<https://www.ramseycounty.us/residents/elections-voting>) for more information. Apply for your ballot as soon as you can.

7. When do I have to register to vote?

You must register if you have:

- Never voted before
- Not voted in the last four years
- Moved since last voting
- Changed your name since last voting



Election Day Tips

If you are concerned about standing in long lines, vote during non-peak hours. (Peak hours are generally 7-9 A.M., and 4-8 P.M.)

Look for reserved parking sites at all polling places.

All polling places are accessible for persons with disabilities. If necessary, election judges will bring a ballot to your car.

8. How can I register?

You can register to vote online. You must meet eligibility guidelines, provide an email address, and provide an identification number from either your Minnesota Driver's License, Minnesota ID card or the last four digits of your Social Security Number.

You can also submit your completed voter registration application to Ramey County Elections by mail or in person. You may also be able to register at your polling place on Election Day if you bring approved identification with you.

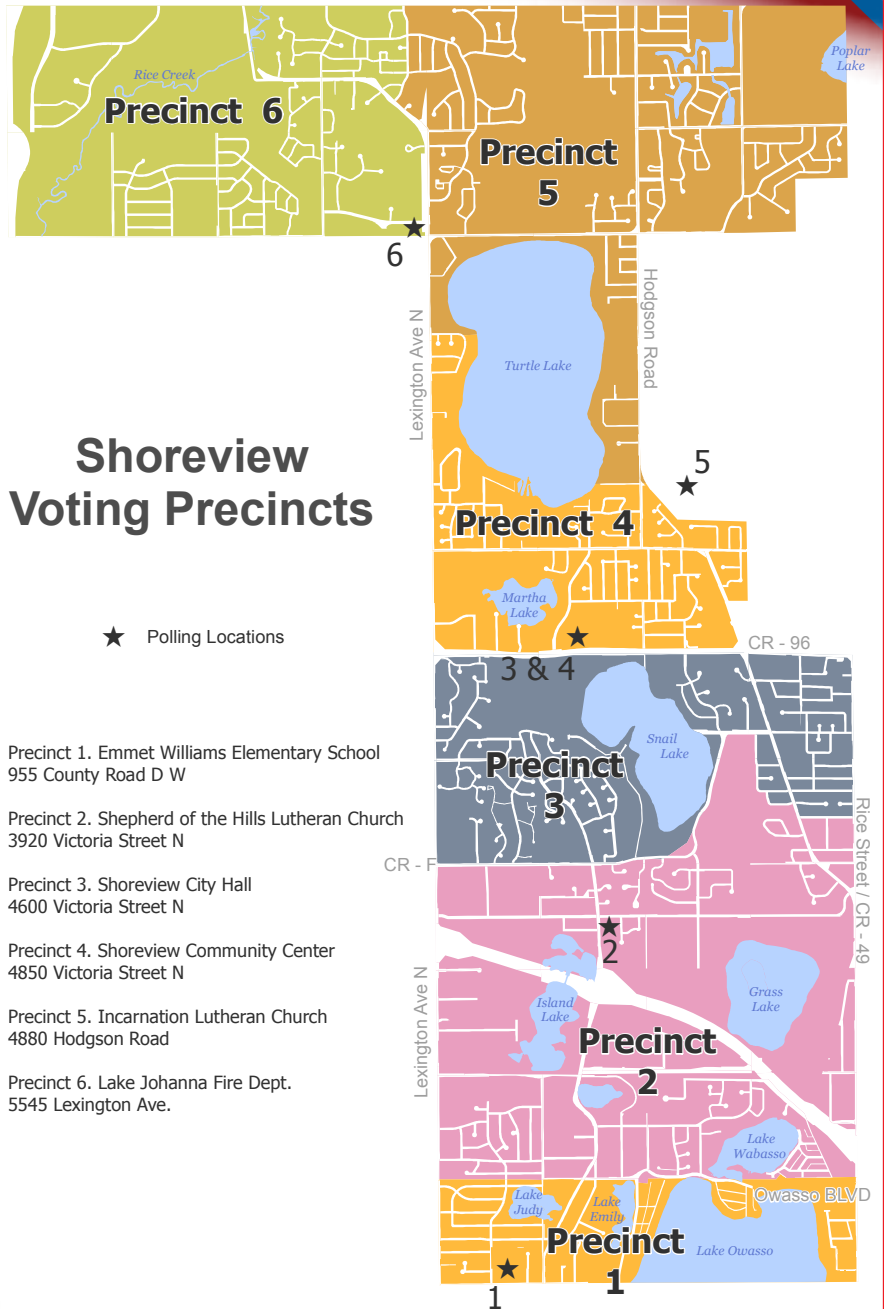

Sheriff staff were on hand with a variety of squads and equipment to interact with and get to know residents. There were great turnouts at both events, with deputies having as much fun as the kids.

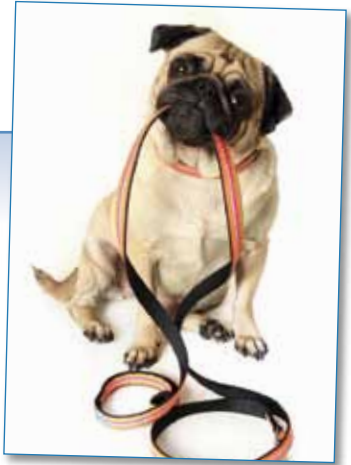


Outdoor Fun for Dogs in Shoreview

Dogs need to exercise and socialize, too! Bring them out for some fun at the off-leash dog areas located within the hockey rinks at Bucher Park, Wilson Park and Bobby Theisen Park. The City provides benches and trash receptacles in each of these areas, which will be open through November 1. They are intended to complement the large County-operated off-leash dog area in Rice Creek Open Space off Lexington Avenue in northwest Shoreview.

The following rules apply:

- Owners must ensure that dogs are leashed prior to entering and upon leaving the area.
- Owners must be in verbal control of their dogs at all times and prevent aggressive behavior, biting, fighting or excessive barking.
- Owners are liable for damage or injury inflicted by their dogs.
- Owners are responsible for cleanup and disposal of feces.

LICENSING

Shoreview City Code of Ordinance requires that all domestic animals kept, harbored or maintained by their owners in the City be licensed and registered. For pets that lose the license tag, duplicate tags are available at City Hall.

CLEANING UP

With many outdoor activities happening, it's a good time to remember the need to clean up after our pets. City ordinance requires dog owners to clean up their own yards and to clean up dog droppings immediately and dispose of it properly when out for walks – please carry supplies for excrement removal.

Here are some more reasons to pick up:

By cleaning up after your dog, you are showing respect for your neighbors and community. Only irresponsible dog owners leave their dog's excrement for others to look at, step in or clean up.

Abandoned dog droppings are also unhealthy, since they can host diseases and parasites which can infect other dogs that come into contact with it. They can also be

transmitted to people who accidentally step in it and track it home. Children who play on the ground are particularly at risk.

Dog owners that don't pick up make all dog owners look bad – a major reason for negative public sentiment against dogs. Every time you don't pick up after your dog, you are giving one more reason for others to dislike dogs and dog owners.

LEASH LAWS

Animals are not allowed to roam freely and must be confined inside your property line by fencing, leash or enclosure.

When off your property, you must have your pet restrained on a leash that is not more than six (6) feet in length.

Leash laws are an important part of the City Code of Ordinances which can be found on the city website at www.shoreviewmn.gov.



Lake Owasso County Park is a nine-acre park located in Shoreview between Lake Owasso and Lake Wabasso. The park was opened in the 1960s, and no substantial development has taken place since that time. Planning for a large redevelopment project began in late August.

Residents and park visitors are encouraged to attend a planning meeting and Open House on November 17, 2016 from 6 to 8 p.m. to provide input on park design, facilities and amenities. It will take place at Ramsey County Public Works, 1425 Paul Kirkwood Dr., Arden Hills.

Every Lawn is a Lakeshore

You may not realize that runoff from your property eventually ends up in our lakes and ponds. That's why it's important to take care of your yard in a way that minimizes that impact. Here are some quick tips for fall lawn care:

Leaves

Rake them up and compost them in your back yard or at the free Ramsey County Yard Waste site. Sweep leaves (and grass clippings) out of the curb and prevent them from going into the stormwater system. Decomposing leaves add nutrients to lakes and storm water ponds, which can foul the water and cause ugly and smelly algae blooms next year.

Over seed

Fall is the best time to overseed your lawn because grass prefers the cooler weather when it wants to grow. Thicker grass crowds out weeds naturally. Just be sure to do it early enough to give the lawn time to establish itself before winter weather hits.

Aerate

Aerating relieves compaction, prunes grass roots and allows water and nutrients to find their way into the root zone of the turf.

Dethatch

Thatch is the layer of fibrous material and organic debris that can accumulate on the depths of your lawn. It prevents water from reaching the soil, encourages diseases, and stops grass from thickening.

Topdressing

Sprinkle a thin layer of compost on your lawn. This improves your soil quality. Good soil structure encourages worm activity that, in turn, improves drainage. Worms also help take surface debris down into the soil – so it's like getting free fertilizer.

Yard Waste Collection Sites

As a Ramsey County resident, you can take advantage of free yard waste collection sites through November 30. They accept trees and shrubs, as well as leaves, grass clippings and other soft and woody plants at locations in Arden Hills/ New Brighton (3530 Hudson Avenue, Arden Hills) and Shoreview/White Bear Township (5900 Sherwood Road, White Bear Township). Sod and dirt are only accepted at the White Bear Township site.

Collection hours until November 30 (weather permitting) are:

Monday, Wednesday and Friday –

11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Saturday – 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Sunday – 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Tuesday and Thursday – Closed

Fall Lawn Care Tips



It's that time of the year – crisp autumn air and falling leaves. It's a beautiful time of year, but it also means fall chores need to be done to prepare for winter.

- When raking your yard, do not rake leaves or grass into the streets or gutters. Materials can wash into storm drains that lead directly into nearby lakes and ponds and can harm lake water quality.
- Dispose of grass clippings, weed clippings, and leaves in a reasonable timeline. Either haul to a free county site that accepts brush or ask your garbage hauler to take it away (they may charge a fee). Log on to www.ramseycounty.us and click on the **Yard Waste** link or call 651-633-3279 for disposal options or for the location of sites that accept yard waste.
- Grass and weeds may not grow taller than 9 inches.
- Yard waste, including trash, leaves or twigs cannot be burned in a backyard fire.
- Composting areas shall be located in a rear yard, at least ten feet from any property line, at least thirty feet from any adjoining residence and designed so that seepage from the compost will not run off into public or private streets, storm sewers, drainage ditches, water retention basins, wetland areas, streams or lakes.
- Waste, debris, recycling and refuse containers must be kept out of public view except on collection day.

Recreational Vehicle and Boat/Trailer Parking and Storage

The City often receives calls from residents wondering about trailers, boats, campers and parked on city streets or in driveways.

- City code requires that all vehicles be licensed, operable and completely (not partially) parked on an approved parking surface. They cannot be parked on the grass.
- Unlicensed or inoperable cars must be stored in a garage.
- Recreational vehicles, boats, ATV's, snowmobiles, special purpose trailers or other vehicles designed or used for off-road purposes may be parked or stored in a garage or lawfully erected building, or may be parked or stored outdoors as follows:
 - No more than two such vehicles, not more than one of which is a recreational vehicle, shall be parked or stored outdoors on each lot.
 - Any vehicle parked or stored outdoors shall be owned or leased by the occupant of the premises where parked or stored.
 - Any such vehicle shall not be parked or stored within five feet of a side yard lot line, or within ten feet

of a rear yard property line. Vehicles may be parked within the required front setback provided vehicles are parked on an approved asphalt, concrete or similar approved hard surface and shall not be within five feet of the front yard property line.



- Recreational vehicles shall not be used as temporary or permanent living quarters.
- City Code prohibits parking your vehicles on the grass or other non-approved hard surface next to the garage or in the backyard.

Maintaining your property helps strengthen Shoreview's reputation for livability and quality of life. It strengthens property values and encourages reinvestment in our community. Shoreview's 2016 Green Community Award Winners



Four Shoreview families and one commercial building have found that being green is saving them some serious green. The winners of this year's Shoreview Green Community Awards installed rain gardens, solar panels and geothermal heating/cooling systems that improve water quality and save energy. And they found out that their new systems will pay for themselves over time.



Barb Cayemberg and Robert Jablonski • Lois Drive

Barb Cayemberg and Robert Jablonski lost an ash tree to the emerald ash borer. When the tree was removed they discovered they had a significant amount of sunlight on the roof of their house and garage. They put in 20 Minnesota made solar panels. Between tax rebates and sales of the panel's electricity to Xcel Energy, they estimate the panels will pay for themselves in 8 ½ years.



Veterans Journey Home MN • North Owasso Blvd

This new house was built by a non-profit and will become the home of a military veteran and family. They used insulated concrete forms and installed a geo-thermal heating and cooling system. As a result, they estimate the monthly winter heating bill will be about \$20.



Paul and Michelle Gardner • Dawn Avenue

The Gardners needed to dig up the front yard to remove tree roots from their sewer line. So they decided to make a series of improvements at the same time. With financial help from Ramsey-Washington County Watershed District, they installed a raingarden in the front yard, which has a curb cut to take in water from the street. They also directed three downspouts into the raingarden. This keeps water out of their basement and out of the storm sewer system. They also installed a geo-thermal heating and cooling system.

Mike and Lisa Cartwright • Royal Oaks Drive

The Cartwrights installed 22 solar panels on the south facing portion of their house. Their electricity bills have dropped substantially. But it didn't stop there. Mike and his fellow science teachers at Mounds View High School advocated for the district to install solar panels on six school buildings (including Island Lake Elementary in Shoreview). The solar panels are anticipated to save the District nearly \$1 million in electricity costs over the next 25 years.



MAPE Building • Lexington Avenue

Water finds its way to the lowest point and, in this case, it was the basement of the MAPE building. Water from the sump pump was either flowing into the storm sewer system or, in the winter, was freezing on a sidewalk used by employees. Instead, MAPE removed the sidewalk and one driveway and replaced them with raingardens. They also added infiltration gardens in their parking lot islands. Not only did this solve the water problems, it created beautiful garden space that attracts butterflies and other pollinators.



In addition to bragging rights, Green Community Award winners receive a small lawn stake they can proudly display, and they will be recognized at a City Council meeting.

Buckthorn Busting Basics

Excerpts from Carole Gernes, Ramsey Conservation District, Cooperative Weed Management Area Program Coordinator

What is buckthorn, and what does it look

like? Buckthorn is one of the most invasive species found in Minnesota, and it is increasingly being found in Shoreview. Common buckthorn is a chameleon of the shrub world. Here are some tips to help you identify it:

- The leaves can vary in size, but always have a few curving (not straight) veins and rounded teeth on the edge of the leaves
- Leaves and buds can vary in their arrangement on branches. Some may be opposite (straight across from each other), sub opposite (almost straight across from each other) or alternate (staggered). Common buckthorn is unique in our area. Sometimes all three of these arrangements may be found on the same plant.
- Buds are dark brown to black and hug the twig. When opposite from each other the two buds combined resemble the bottom of a deer hoof.
- Often, there is a short sharp thorn at the tip of the twig. These may fall off or continue to grow over the years.
- In the fall, common buckthorn leaves stay green and on the shrub, long after other trees and shrubs have turned color or lost their leaves. Waiting until fall colors are strong will help prevent accidental removal of beneficial shrubs.

- Follow the label directions, with one exception: do not drill holes in the stump and pour in herbicide. Applying herbicide to the orange/yellow layer of fiber, just under the thin bark is sufficient to kill the plant. Buckthorn has very dense, hard wood. Herbicide poured into holes in the heart of the wood will not move to the root to kill the shrub.
- Leaving the stumps and roots in place will also prevent soil erosion until new plantings become established.



Did You Know?

Fall is the best time to cut and chemically treat buckthorn stumps.

How can I get rid of buckthorn? Are some methods better than others?

- Pulling is no longer recommended. Minnesota DNR Trails managers and others have noticed quick colonization by garlic mustard and other invasive plants and weeds after pulling. Areas where soil has been disturbed are more likely to be invaded with new weeds and buckthorn seedlings in following years.
- Cut and immediately treat stumps with a herbicide containing Triclopyr as an active ingredient of 8 or 8.8%. Glyphosate should be at least 25%.

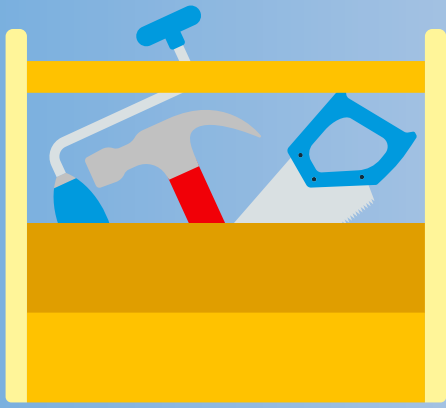

MHFA FIX UP FUND

Before you begin your home improvement project, call to learn about the MHFA Fix Up Fund loan! You may be eligible for up to \$35,000! Most home improvements qualify, except for luxury items (such as swimming pools). The maximum income amount is \$96,500.

SHOREVIEW HOME IMPROVEMENT LOAN PROGRAM

The City of Shoreview is offering loans to residents to encourage home improvement and increase the home values within the City of Shoreview. You may be eligible for up to \$20,000 to use toward energy efficiency and/or improvements that may improve the livability of the home, function of the operating systems, and overall appearance of the structure and property. The total gross annual household income cannot exceed 120% of the Shoreview median household income and the current value of the house cannot exceed \$314,640.

RAMSEY COUNTY DEFERRED LOAN

This zero interest loan is for owner-occupied, single family properties. Maximum loan is \$15,000 for home improvements. Eligible properties must be at least 15 years old and meet the estimated market value limit. Condominium and townhomes are eligible for interior repairs only. There are two tiers for income. Tier-One is Low Income Households, with a gross annual income at or below 50% of the area median income. Tier-Two is Medium Income for households with a gross annual income between 50% and 80% of the area median income. Finance terms depend on Tier.

The 45th Anniversary of a Terrible Tragedy



September 7, 1971: A beautiful sunny Wednesday – and the date for the most horrific construction accident in Shoreview. Seven lives were lost when the KSTP and WCCO 1350 television tower, being constructed at the intersection of County Road F and Victoria, came crashing to the ground.

Three antennas were being constructed on top of a steel beam platform that was five feet thick. Each antenna was 90 feet in height, and a 13 ton steel beam was in the process of being lifted off the ground when the accident occurred. Six workers at the 1000 foot level fell to their death, and another worker on the ground was also killed.

The tower began to buckle and crack, and finally it crashed to the ground. More than 500 tons of steel wreckage was removed from the site. According to published reports, this was a first time procedure that had not been attempted before.

WCCO - TV was broadcasting from a room at the bottom of the tower, and two employees narrowly escaped death during the accident.

The tower was eventually rebuilt in a twin configuration and at a shorter height. Their lights can be seen from miles as a beacon to identify Shoreview.

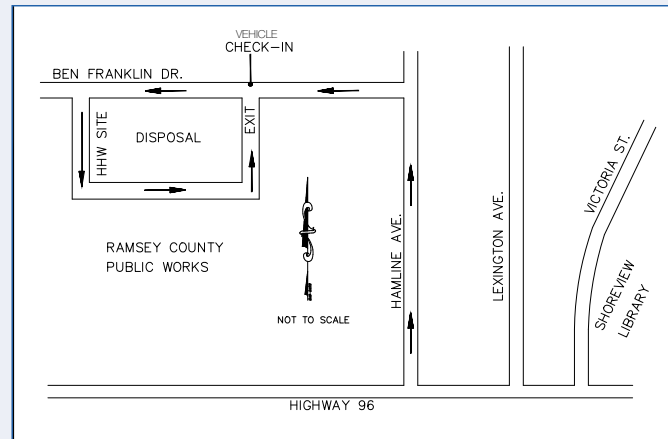

Check out these resources for donations, recycling, and proper disposal options:

A to Z Recycling & Disposal Guide: Visit Ramseyrecycles.com and check out the **A TO Z RECYCLING & DISPOSAL GUIDE:** Look up specific items from Aquariums to Zinc batteries. Quite often there are excellent reuse ideas, as well as donation locations. Most items will identify if they are recyclable or else provide disposal options.

Medicine Collection: Safely dispose of unwanted, expired and unused medicines for free at one of three public drop boxes in Ramsey County (pet medicines included). Safe disposal of unwanted medicine helps prevent crime, drug abuse, and accidental poisoning. Not flushing medicines down the drain or disposing of them in the trash helps protect our environment.

Yard Waste and Organics: Ramsey County operates seven **YARD WASTE COLLECTION SITES**. All sites are free and open to Ramsey County residents only, a **photo ID is required**. Items accepted vary by site – all yard waste sites (except Arden Hills) have an organics recycling bin and the attendant can provide you free compostable bags.

Household Hazardous Waste: Many household products you use to clean your kitchen and bathroom, maintain your car and home, and

control animals and insects contain hazardous chemicals. If a container has the words **CAUTION, WARNING, DANGER or POISON** on the label and still has product inside, it does not belong in the trash. This includes energy efficient light bulbs and fluorescent light bulbs. Use Ramsey County's free household hazardous waste collection sites (open year-round) for safe disposal.

Have a broken item that you wish to fix? Check out the **RAMSEY COUNTY FIX-IT CLINICS!** Get household items fixed for free and learn valuable repair skills at an upcoming Fix-It Clinic. At Fix-It Clinics, residents bring in small household appliances, clothing, electronics, mobile devices and more to receive free guided assistance from volunteers with repair skills to disassemble, troubleshoot and fix items. Fix-It Clinics build community connections and reduce the number of repairable objects that are thrown in the trash.
